
### GRAMMAR PARENTS FRIENDS

Our students do have incredible opportunities to travel the world with our varied tours program, but today and in the future, they are more connected than ever socially and culturally through technology, travel and as people migrate. We continue to build an attitude that our actions impact environmentally as we share one planet, and that our decisions have ramifications beyond the gates of Grammar.

The role of our teachers in this has not been to provide all the answers, so very difficult anyway given the pace of the world, but recognise global citizens are active participants in their own learning. Our students are encouraged to explore, develop and express their own values and opinions as they respect the perspectives of others.

Over our 23 year history our students have had the opportunities to travel in groups and teams to the corners of the globe to participate in service learning, play sport, develop a greater understanding of the diversity of identities and cultures around the world, hone their language skills and build relationships with their peers. We are on the eve of our third service learning tour to Timor Leste. A chance to enhance our partnership with schools and organisations in Maliana, but more importantly to learn from others and examine our own lives.

In 2018, PISA introduced global competency in to their assessment regime. Grammar has a responsibility to extend our teaching and learning to address the competencies required for globalisation. Our students must be well prepared to live and succeed in tomorrow's global economy and multicultural societies.

- The ability to critically examine issues such as poverty, inequality, environmental challenges, conflict and stereotypes as some examples.

- 4. To contribute meaningfully to sustainability and wellbeing for their own communities and beyond.

Global competency in the 21st century requires a new lens, a fresh set of eyes on how we see the world and our place in it. It is both challenging and inspiring for our students.





### GLOBAL PARTNERSHIPS TOUR TO TIMOR LESTE

The biannual Grammar Global Partnerships Tour to Timor Leste will take place over the September school holidays. The 34 students and 4 staff will be following in the footsteps of the past two tours where participants have enjoyed immersing themselves in the local community of Maliana, since 2015.

During the group's time in Maliana they will take part in a range of activities alongside local schools and community organisations. Grammar has enjoyed strengthening relationships with many English language centres, church run community groups and junior and secondary schools, and this tour will provide opportunities for students to connect in and out of the classroom.

From teaching English, playing sports and games, taking part in community art projects and song and dance lessons, our students are looking forward to the trip of a lifetime. The school continues to look for opportunities to strengthen our partnerships with Timor and to work together in developing meaningful and purposeful relationships centred around education.

Our Grammar Timor Network has worked hard to create a range of classroom resources for our Timor friends and their recent sponsorship of a book program has resulted in over 100 early reader books being packed ready to make their way to libraries and schools in Maliana and beyond.

Our sincere thanks to all our Grammar community who have wished us well and supported us in keeping our global partnership program strong at Grammar.









Help where help is needed most

Chase dreams instead of wonder.
Leave footprints where there is danger. Touch the lives of strangers.
Embrace opportunities that bring us together.

Por qué quieres ser psicóloga? (Why do you want to be a psychologist?). I fully embraced my time-old answer to this question when I helped where help was needed most. Perched on a colourful woven mat laid atop the dirt floor of my Argentinian home-stay, I had just bitten into a glossy red apple, when an emaciated, frail body climbed into my lap, framed my face with tiny palms, and became seemingly enchanted by my relished consumption. I soon learnt that Leila was the youngest daughter of five, loved parrots, hadn't eaten one solid food since her birth, and was severely malnourished. Leila and her family had used the rent from their home-stay to consult six medical professionals, each of whom had prescribed Leila nutritional supplements. Leila's health had not improved and she persistently refused all foods. Leila was dying.

Home-stay gave me the privilege of observing Leila's unique relationship with food, family dynamics and routines, and the systematic context of eating; information that Leila's doctors would not have been privy to. I was seeing key markers of an anxiety disorder, which was being perpetuated by the reactions of her family and medical professionals. I shared my conceptualisation with Leila's parents who, never having been educated about mental health, eagerly gave me their blessing to provide play-based

therapy in my very broken Spanish. Leila and I created the "manzana" (apple) song (which sounded very similar to a tune sung by minions), made mud and stone cupcakes for her dolls, pretended to be sloths eating bananas, created fruit faces from the produce we collected from the local jungle, had dulce de leche (caramel) face masks, wrote a story about her ideal picnic, and recreated said picnic where she took her first bite of an apple.

My intention was to change Leila's relationship with food. Food, which was once resented, feared and highly emotional for all family members, was now being explored and enjoyed. In-home modelling allowed all family members to adopt the same approach and ultimately prevent relapse when I departed.

Upon returning to Australia in late 2018, I received a letter from an Argentinian doctor confirming Leila is of healthy weight and eating solid foods. He thanked me for saving her life, and I now thank every person who contributed to the education that allowed me to become a psychologist, and help where it is needed most.





Many students are taking advantage of Grammar's relationship with the European Languages Organisation to further their language learning. ELO are our sister-school organisation and Grammar first began the exchange with Aurillac through them in 2000. Since then our Tour programs have gone from strength to strength and next year we will have 35 students who are currently studying French participating in a Tour to France.

In April 2000, Grammar students embarked on their first exchange to France. This was the start of what was to become an enduring relationship allowing literally hundreds of students to experience, firsthand, life on the other side of the world, immersed in another culture, and provided opportunities for students and teachers to develop linguistic skills.

In addition to these tours, there is also the opportunity for exchange and in recent years, we have had a number of students spend extended time in France as part of the ELO program. This year, one of our Year 11 students has already taken a three-week exchange over the Easter break and in Term 4 we have two Year 10 students heading over to Aurillac for the full term - we are already taking enquiries for French students to join us in 2020 too! These exchanges allow students to make remarkable progress in French whilst also experiencing everything that family life and French culture has to offer.

We often talk about the need for our students to become "global citizens", even more important in today's world where many of us will end up travelling or working and living overseas. It is clear that the most enduring and valued benefits are those from relationships and making connections.

What we love most is that many of our students have continued friendships well beyond the limits of the program and have long-standing relationships with families in Aurillac that have resulted in family visits to France, university exchange programs, jobs in France and visits and assistance with work experience. On Bastille Day Assembly, one of our 2016 Alumni, Camille



Hansen, popped in to talk about her reflections and family involvement with ELO and the exchange program.

"The 2014 tour was an amazing experience that really opened my eyes to the French culture and life. I had only just turned 15, and looking back it seems incredible that I was given the chance to live with a French family for two weeks. During this time, I attended school at Lycée Emile Duclaux. I also had the chance to visit Paris and it was a bit like speed dating, in the way that we got to see a small amount of all the major landmarks and just enough to make me want to go back!

"If the French Tour was eye opening, my two and a half months on exchange were life changing. I not only learnt a lot about language and culture, but also learnt a lot about growing up and being independent. I made some amazing friendships that I know I will have for a very long time.

"I'm now at university in third year Physiotherapy and whilst I'm sure my French is a bit rusty, I have the chance to complete a placement in a hospital on the Spanish/French border next year, something that would not be possible without the language skills I gained through my exchanges.

"My exchange was honestly one of those experiences in my life that I will never forget; something that I'm sure one day I will tell my kids all about, and something that I would recommend to everybody if you have the chance."

We also recently had a visit from one of our 2014 alumni, George Britchford. During his time at Grammar, George was an exceptional linguist and our first to study both French and Japanese at Senior, and Senior Italian through Distance Education. He was well known for his successes at the MLTAQ Speech Competition and participated in a yearlong exchange to Europe through WEP, as well as taking part in our 2014 Tour to Aurillac. He graduated with a BA in Russian, Linguistics and Translating from the University of Queensland and has been working with Mirima Dawang Woorlab-gerring in the Kimberley on projects to develop the local language since 2016. We are incredibly proud of the direction George's language skills have taken him and look forward to hearing where his career pathway takes him in the future.



At the end of last term we were approached by the Sunshine Coast Council and the Union Language Institute, an organisation based in Brisbane, but expanding to the Coast. They offer edutourism opportunities for international students to experience immersion and school visits in Australian schools. We welcomed a small group of 8 students (aged 10-13 years) from China who spent a week in the Primary School. Two other groups visit later in the term. This is a great opportunity to showcase our school and form relationships with other international students and teachers.

### French visitors from Aurillac

There has been an excited buzz around the French Department this term with the arrival of 28 students and two teachers from Aurillac. Shortly after students returned from Camp Week, our French visitors were welcomed into the homes of our wonderful hosting families. During their stay they were involved in many activities including a visit to Australia Zoo and Noosa, whale watching from Mooloolaba, surfing in Coolum after climbing the peak, alongside some aboriginal cultural experiences and our Athletics Carnival! There were lots of tears when it came to the farewells and for many students it has given them even more motivation as they travel to France next year to hone their language studies and maintain the friendships formed on Tour. Our amazing host families once again were generous with their time and hospitality, and the French students were incredibly grateful for such a warm welcome. A big thank you must also go to the Guteridge family for hosting the French teachers, Olivier and Sandrine, and to all staff who accommodated students into their classroom and helped with events. An amazing, extended Grammar family effort, for which we are truly grateful. Merci à tous!

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Students at Sunshine Coast Grammar School have again recorded strong performances on the annual NAPLAN tests, with high mean scores across all areas confirming the School's place as one of the top academic performers in the region.

Sunshine Coast Grammar School's mean was well above both the State and National means in all areas tested: Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar/Punctuation and Numeracy.

Students across all year levels tested (Years 3, 5, 7 and 9) achieved between 94% and 100% above the National Minimum Standard in all categories for 2019.

Sunshine Coast Grammar School was the Coast's best performing Secondary School, and among the top 20 in the state, based on Year 7 and 9 student results.

Sunshine Coast Grammar School Principal, Mrs Maria Woods, said that she was proud of the School's continued strong performance, which is a fine testament to the quality of teaching staff, the commitment of students and the support of parents.

"The results show that all our cohorts are operating well above national means in all of the NAPLAN tests. We are particularly pleased with the performance of our Secondary students who placed in the top 20 in Queensland," said Mrs Woods.

"I am delighted to see that so many of our students are continuing to build on their results and achieve above not only the set minimum standards, but both the State and National mean scores, which really underlines the Grammar philosophy of high expectations and opportunities for students of all abilities. This is something we will continue to foster and celebrate," Mrs Woods said.

"While this data is a useful tool for schools and transparency is important, it is only one set of results and I advise parents against placing too much importance on this test alone," she said.

"A school is so much more than the results of one set of tests taken at one point in the year and I encourage parents to look beyond test scores when comparing schools," Mrs Woods said. Grammar strives to support every student in achieving their full potential and are proud that our curriculum offers students one of the best all-round educations in the state.





### ICT Explorers Competition

In August, two teams travelled to the University of Queensland in Brisbane to take part in the State Judging of the Young ICT Explorers Competition.

The competition encourages school students to create their best Information and Communication Technology (ICT) related projects and enables students to apply what they learn in their ICT/Digital Technologies classroom to develop a technology related project of their choice.

The Year 7 and 8 team of Finn B-S and Tristan B-S created a website that provides a connection between students and staff at school which allows students to complete short surveys at any time. The surveys were focused on issues such as 'My School Work' and 'My Wellbeing'. They can be submitted as often as the student likes and can be filled in anonymously. The information is then sent to a database, that can be read by teachers and the issues can be dealt with effectively.

Finn and Tristan took out first place and won \$150 each and are invited to the National Competition in Sydney on 7 December.

The Year 9 team of Jakob K-B, Luke S, James S and Oliver D created an intuitive exoskeleton arm for medical and rehabilitation purposes, specifically for stroke survivors. They devised a cost effective and simple solution by using PLA in conjunction with 3D printing and developing electronics to make the arm intuitive. The team ended up using a load cell and HX711 module that sensed if the arm was moving up and down and servo to assist with the movements. Unfortunately the Year 9 team did not place, but they look forward to designing, creating and competing again next year.











Our Prep Bike and Scooter Day was a huge success, children zoomed around the car park and learnt a little more about road safety and put their riding skills to the test!

### ANZ SERVES UP ACE PARTNERSHIP






### A QUALITY NIGHT'S SLEEP

relationship with the Sunshine Coast Mind and Neuroscience Thompson Institute, many of our Year 7 students have taken part in the study. The study is the first of its kind because researchers are scanning young people's brains three times a year during the rapidly changing period of adolescence, as well as discussing what is happening in their lives, including stresses and influences. Early findings have revealed significant links between sleep quality and mental well-being in 12-year olds.




This semester in Year 9


### Swimming

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
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We are excited to be introducing a new pathway at Grammar in 2020, designed for students interested in engineering and aviation.

The Skills Generation Build and Fly a Drone Project will be offered to students in Year 10, 11 and 12 wanting to obtain knowledge and experience in a broad range of engineering disciplines. Students will also have the opportunity to gain insights in the exciting and growing employment pathways in the trade, engineering and aviation industries through gaining their certificate qualifications.

In Year 10 students will complete their Certificate II in Engineering Pathways and in Year 11 and 12 they will complete their Certificate III in Aviation (Remote Pilot -Visual Line of Sight).

Skills Generation's Build and Fly a Drone Project provides students with the skills and knowledge to be prepared to integrate traditonal engineering skills with modern technologies. I am a Ma & Morley Scholar which was a scholarship founded by the friendship between the Morley family from Newcastle and Jack Ma, who is a Chinese billionaire, world leader, businessman and philanthropist. The scholarship aims to cultivate the next generation of globally aware and socially conscious leaders through its transformative program and experiences. I also received the Faculty of Engineering and Built Environment Relocation Scholarship, and a Women in Engineering Scholarship.

In addition, I was offered the Catherine and Peter Tay High Achiever Engineering Scholarship which is offered to the highest ranked commencing student in the Faculty of Engineering and Built Environment with an ATAR score of 99.0 or above; however,

I was unable to accept this due to my other scholarships.

This year has been exciting with my studies and my Ma & Morley Scholarship Program. My degree has already been engaging and challenging, with our first project being to construct a wearable Electrocardiograph that can be used to investigate the cardiac cycles of a patient. My Ma & Morley Scholarship Program has involved leadership training with a Newcastle Jets player and coach, meeting the founder of International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) and the 2017 Nobel Peace Prize Winner, as well as an Indigenous Immersion camp to Wollombi NSW. I have recently returned from our Cultural Immersion trip to China where we spent 10 days in Shanghai, Hangzhou and Beijing. We explored the cities and major landmarks, learnt from foundations and companies that align with our program's values, and met Jack Ma.

I hope to use my degree in Medical Engineering and skills that the Ma & Morley Scholarship provides me when I graduate, since advancements in technology are driving a need for engineers with specialised medical skills. I would love to create prosthetics and physical therapy devices for accident survivors, people with illnesses and war survivors in the future.

I have to accredit much of my success so far to the teachers and leaders at Grammar who have taught and inspired me throughout high school. Although I am only one semester through my degree, I don't believe I would have achieved as highly in engineering without my foundational knowledge in mathematics and physics, as well as problem solving skills, which I gained primarily from Mr Burnett, Mr Martin and Mr Evans. Beyond this, there are so many teachers who taught me, inspired me and supported me at Grammar, and undoubtedly helped me to get to where I am now.









After graduating from Grammar in 2011, I moved to Brisbane where I lived for three years and completed half a Business degree at OUT. Whilst studying Business I was working casually at a Law firm, which made me question my desire to be working a regular 9-5 job. In my last year at QUT, I started looking into other career paths and came across Nursing. "I have learned we all have prejudices we're not

even aware of, and that there is no room for racism," said George. "It is about respecting everyone's journey."

While George's journey at school was not always easy, he loved his teachers who instilled in him a passion for learning and ensured he has nothing but amazing memories of Grammar. George also tributes his older sister, Elizabeth, from the Class of 2011 as a role model who continually inspires him.

"Elizabeth is crazy cool, quick witted and a successful lawyer in Sydney. I think brothers should always look up to their sisters."

### EMILY DRING CLASS OF 2017




Emily is currently attending the University of the Sunshine Coast, studying a double degree in Law and Business and hoping to pursue a career in the legal field once she graduates.
